



Q2 - What would you consider to be important when thinking about the name of a university? You may be as broad or as specific as you like in your response.




Q3 - Below are a handful of considerations that go into naming a university. Please drag and drop them to rank them in order of importance, where 1 is most important and 6 is least important.








Q6 - Thinking now about some new names for the Mississippi University for Women, below are some potential options for the university that focus on its location. From this list, please select the three you like the most.







Therefore, the lower the number equals a higher ranking in preference.


Q11 - You mentioned that you would like a name for the university based on its location that was not mentioned. What name(s) did you have in mind?




Q12 - You mentioned that you would like a name for the university based on an historical figure(s) that was not mentioned. What name(s) did you have in mind?


Q17 - What is the highest level of education you have completed?




Q18 - What was your total household income before taxes during the past 12 months?
